Strategies for Conflicting Viewpoints Passages of the TJHSST Entrance Exam

Read and understand two or three statements about scientific theories or hypotheses that conflict with one another.

How will I know it is a Conflicting Viewpoints passage?

- Includes a short introduction paragraph and two to three statements
 - Frequently labeled: Scientist 1, Scientist 2
- Usually will not have many (if any) charts, tables, graphs, or other diagrams

What types of questions will I be asked during these passages?

- Understanding Viewpoints
 - These questions check to make sure you understand each author's point of view
 - Often may ask: what would researcher X predict to happen?
- Comparing Viewpoints
 - · Asks you to point out the similarities and differences between each author

Three steps for tackling Conflicting Viewpoint Passages

IDENTIFY THE PHENOMENON

This is usually located in the very first paragraph. What is the main subject the students or scientists are studying?

UNDERSTAND THE BASIC THEORIES

Ask yourself, how are the basic theories different? How are they similar, if at all? Underline these as well so you can easily reference them later.

CIRCLE THE SUPPORT

Once you've located and underlined the basic theories of each scientist, identify what they are using to support their theory.

Strategy 1: Save It for Last

 This is usually the most difficult passage for students so save it for last of all of the five passages

Strategy 2: Read Selectively & Mark the Margins

- Read the first sentence of the introduction and the first sentence of each argument
- Write a quick note in the margins to help you remember what the position of each scientist is

Strategy 3: Look for Locators

 Many questions will often be asking about only one viewpoint at a time, be sure to go back and read the correct viewpoint to get your answer
